BACHELOR'S OF SCIENCE IN NURSING PROGRAM

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The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program at KU will prepare you for success in any professional nursing practice or health care setting. KU School of Nursing graduates are positioned for career options in hospitals, community health agencies, industrial and long-term care facilities.

The KU School of Nursing, with campuses at KU Medical Center in Kansas City, Kansas, and in Salina, Kansas, is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education. The BSN program at KU provides students:

- Interprofessional clinical opportunities
- Student-centered environment
